Visualising the Oceans: The Australian Experience

1. Introduction

Depending on one's point of view, Australia is either the largest island or the smallest continent. Either way, Australia certainly has an extensive coastline and maritime jurisdiction (Fig. 1). During the last decade, Australia has experienced a growing awareness of this huge marine environment with its maritime rights and responsibilities together with a growth in awareness of broader environmental issues.
